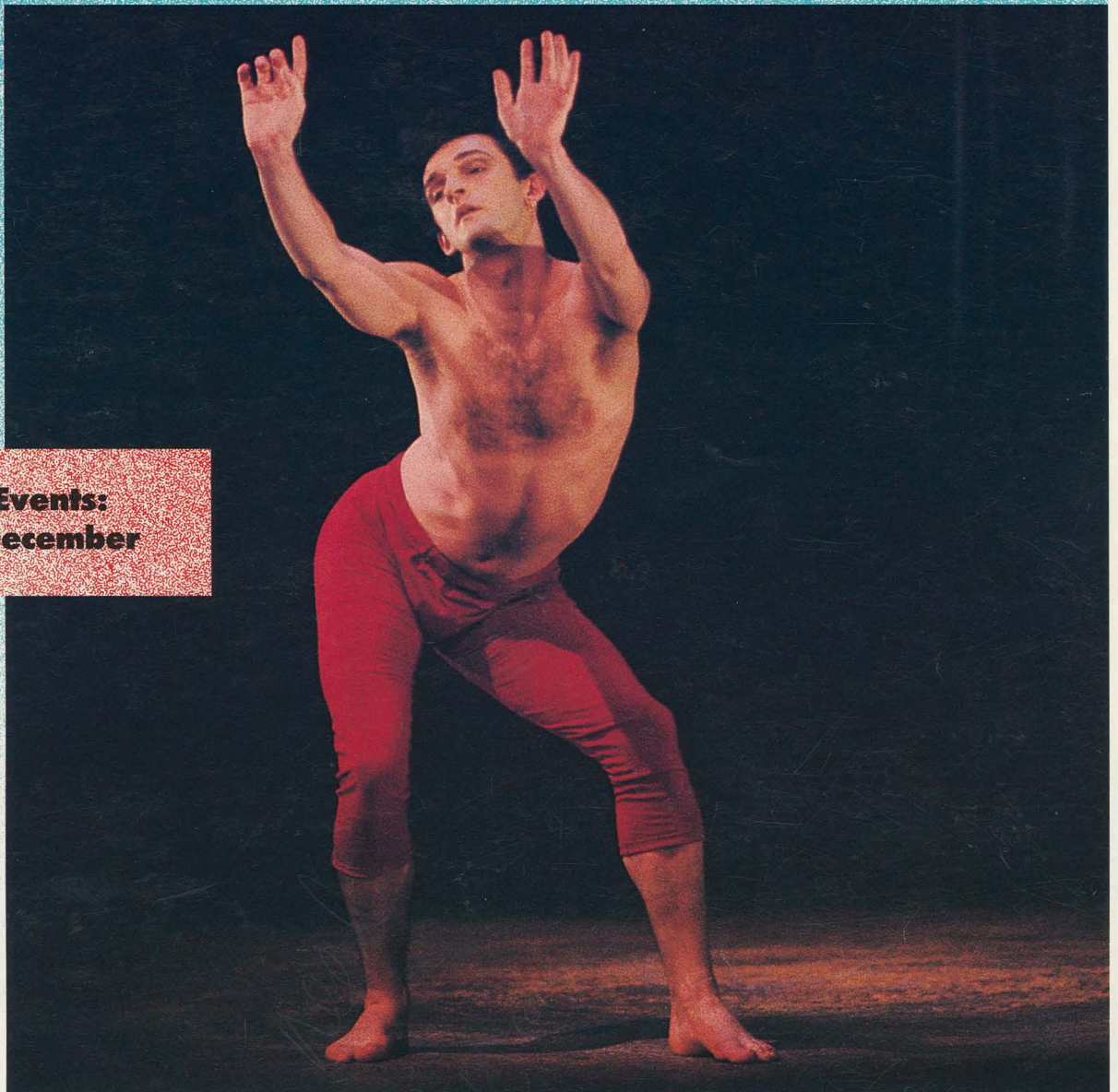

Mark Morris, Artistic Director
Los Angeles debut!

Mark Morris is "the most widely interviewed, most talked-about, and most commissioned young choreographer in American dance" (*New Yorker*); his 12-member company was the sensation of the BAM "Next Wave" Festivals of 1984 and 1986 and was featured on an hour-long PBS "Dance in America" telecast. In addition to choreographing for his own group, Mr. Morris has set works on the Pacific Northwest Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Seattle Opera and Batsheva Dance Company. Characterized by inspired eclecticism, energy, comedy, social commentary and musicality, Mark Morris' dances are set to scores by Vivaldi, Shostakovich, Yoko Ono and Violent Femmes, to name just a few. "His high-voltage fusion of impeccable craftsmanship with unflappable flamboyance has rocketed his Seattle-based company to national prominence" (*Dancemagazine*).

Orpheus Chamber Orchestra

Named for the musician/poet of Greek mythology, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra is an ensemble of 26 virtuoso instrumentalists—16 string and 10 wind players—performing without a conductor. The orchestra members, all accomplished solo and chamber musicians, bring a rich diversity of musical experience to Orpheus, and share responsibility for repertoire, programming and interpretation. Since its New York debut at Lincoln Center in 1974, Orpheus has performed in 24 countries around the world, has its own annual series of concerts at Carnegie Hall with such guest artists as Elly Ameling, Isaac Stern, Yo-Yo Ma and Alicia de Larrocha, to name just a few, and has made a series of acclaimed recordings for Deutsche Grammophon. The Orpheus Chamber Orchestra "performs with enormous verve as well as flawless ensemble and style" (*San Francisco Chronicle*) and is "absolutely first-rate...an extraordinary musical experience" (*The New York Times*).

There's excitement in the air.

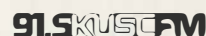
For the second consecutive season, the UCLA Center for the Performing Arts is the "star" of two weekly radio programs in Southern California.
