



Dance superstar Mikhail Baryshnikov returns to the Wexner Center for two concerts with his superb ensemble of 10 dancers accompanied by live chamber music. The program (which will be repeated each night) showcases new stagings of works by modern masters Erick Hawkins and Merce Cunningham and a new piece by young ascendant choreographer Meg Stuart. This vibrant range of contemporary work is in keeping with White Oak Dance Project's artistic mission to honor groundbreaking pioneers while also encouraging the most promising choreographers of our time. Mikhail Baryshnikov will dance in all three works alongside the seasoned talents of his ensemble, whose past experiences include stints with Mark Morris, Boston Ballet, and Twyla Tharp among other prominent companies.

Special Benefit Concerts for the National Dance Project

Baryshnikov's first phone call inviting Meg Stuart to set a work on White Oak came while she was performing at the Wexner Center with Damaged Goods, her own cutting edge company, in 1995. Stuart's new work for White Oak features the entire company and is one of a series of collaborations with well known visual artists. For this piece she is teaming with graphic designer Bruce Mau (designer of architect Rem Koolhaas's visionary volume *S, M, L, XL*) and the template for the Wexner Center's season announcement booklets (among other projects local audiences may remember).

Journey of a Poet, one of the final works by the late master choreographer Erick

Hawkins, will also be premiered on this tour alongside White Oak's revival of Merce Cunningham's *Spectre*, a 1953 classic set to Satie and one of Cunningham's last works derived from an intuitive procedure rather than the chance processes he has subsequently employed.

All proceeds from White Oak Dance Project's appearances will benefit the National Dance Project, an initiative of the New England Foundation for the Arts to establish a consortium of 12 leading arts organizations dedicated to supporting the development of new dance works and ensuring touring visibility for dance. The National Dance Project was established to address, in part, the current crisis in funding for dance artists with the loss of important choreographers' fellowships and commissioning opportunities previously available from the National Endowment for the Arts as well as the regionally allocated Dance On Tour funds for dance presenters. The Wexner Center is honored to be designated one of the 12 "Hub Sites" of the National Dance Project and to collaborate with White Oak Dance Project in furthering the aims of this important project providing support for leading dance artists.

Every Thursday, NYC hotspot the Time Cafe erupts with the hard charging sound of jazz maverick Charles Mingus, whose legacy is kept afame by the Mingus Big Band. On its first national tour, the 14-piece Mingus Big Band highlights the vast range of this jazz giant's charts: gospel-soaked stombs, rousing blues, and lush sections of delicate beauty. In the band's "Who's Who" roster of hot players, Mingus alums join forces with young turks for what *Time Out New York* calls "the hippest big band in the universe—robust, earthy and sanctified." Check out the recently issued double CD set *Live in Time* for a sizzling sample of what these outstanding players will serve up here.

I Don't Want to Love, the piece Mark Morris created during his Wexner Center residency last summer, returns for its U.S. premiere as part of two programs featuring recent repertoire created by one of our foremost dance-makers. Those of you who saw the Morris company's highly entertaining work-in-progress performance at BalletMet studios in June caught a glimpse of how Claudio Monteverdi's madrigals captured Morris's imagination. Since then famed designer Isaac Mizrahi contributed an array of pure white costumes for the brightly rendered work, and *I Don't Want to Love* received its world premiere at the prestigious Edinburgh Festival, where it was greeted as a popular and critical success.

The title of *I Don't Want to Love* is derived from the name of one of the seven Monteverdi madrigals Morris selected for the score, and the work addresses themes of rejected or unrequited love. London's *Financial Times* observed, "Morris treats the subject lightly but with sudden penetrating moments, as when a lover's isolation or a girl's anguish pierces us (and the dancers) to the heart. Loveliest incident is Morris's realisation of *Zefiro Torna* in which the breezes of the title blow the dancers, fluttering and flying and skipping with tiniest steps over the stage and along the music's lines. It is wholly ravishing, and like the entire work, judged with acute skill." The *Daily Telegraph* called *I Don't Want to Love* "a celebratory new work...a winsomely amorous piece," adding, "that sweet heartbeat you feel in Morris's best work strikes up."

Dance fans will want to attend on both evenings to see such works as *One Charming Night*, a witty, Gothic duet featuring Morris as a lovelorn vampire; *A Spell*, lit by delightfully sly humor; *Lucky Charms*, with its sparkling dynamics; and *The Office*, originally created in Columbus for Zivili. As always, Morris's exquisitely musical choreography creates counterpoint and commentary on the chosen score in a way that reveals a profound dedication to the beauty of structure. His love of the spirit of music has dictated a new company policy of performing only to live accompaniment, which will further enliven his programs here.

Morris's selection as recipient of the 1996-97 Wexner Center Residency Award in performing arts and his residency activities last summer reflect and further the Wexner Center's commitment to providing creative support to leading dance artists. These concerts are a fitting celebration and culmination of Morris's activities as a residency artist.

Joan Acocella, noted dance critic for the *Wall Street Journal* and author of a biography of Mark Morris, introduces the choreographer's work and career in this informal lecture. Acocella discusses Morris's youth in Seattle, his immersion in the counterculture of the 1960s and 1970s, his long involvement in folk dance, and his passion for music. She also talks about the dances that will be presented at the Wexner Center, describing the main qualities of Morris's work: its humanism, its classicism, and its extremely broad subject matter, from the strange to the sublime.

Acocella's biography of Morris (titled *Mark Morris*) is available in the Wexner Center Bookshop. She is currently editing the English-language edition of the unexpurgated diary of dance legend Vaslav Nijinsky.

Savion Glover Concerts to Be Rescheduled






